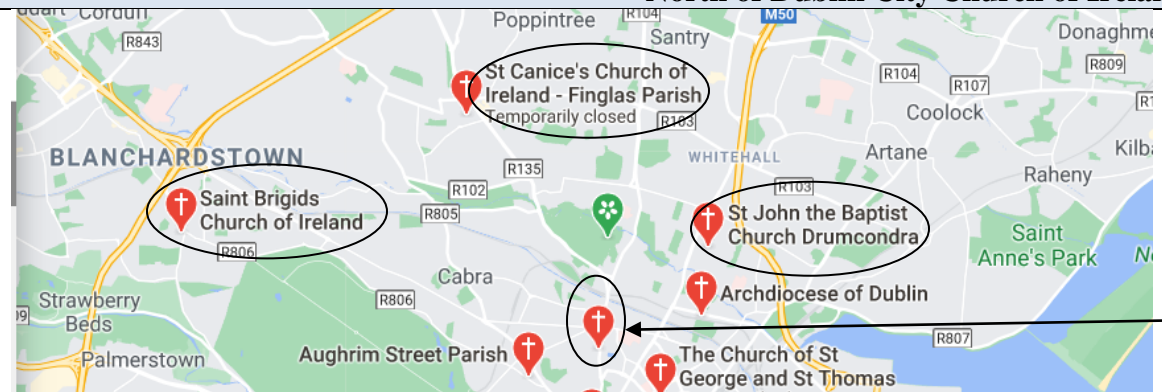


*Dublin Pugh-Pew-Pue- Church of Ireland- What we know and what we don't know.*

The earliest Pue's were Church of Ireland. I suspect they were from England, Wales or Scotland. Some had had positions of power or land, starting with **John Pue** (app 1620-1650) the Alderman/Sheriff of Dublin, and his brother **Maurice**. Suspect he is Welsh as some records refer to him as **Aphugh**. There was a **John Pue, Esq.** (1639-1669) in Wicklow, who I think could have been related, as the Sheriff mentioned a son **Lancelot** in his will, and there was a Lancelot in Wicklow. I suspect it is him as the name is unique. After that there was **Richard Pue<sup>1</sup> and <sup>2</sup>**, printers in Dublin, starting about 1675. Each of these Pues are covered in a separate entry and in Ancestry. The rest are divided by regions and churches.



Katherine is from Doddleston, Cheshire, England, father Thomas, does not fit the naming pattern- her husband is the minister.

There does not seem to be a connection between families per naming pattern or date.

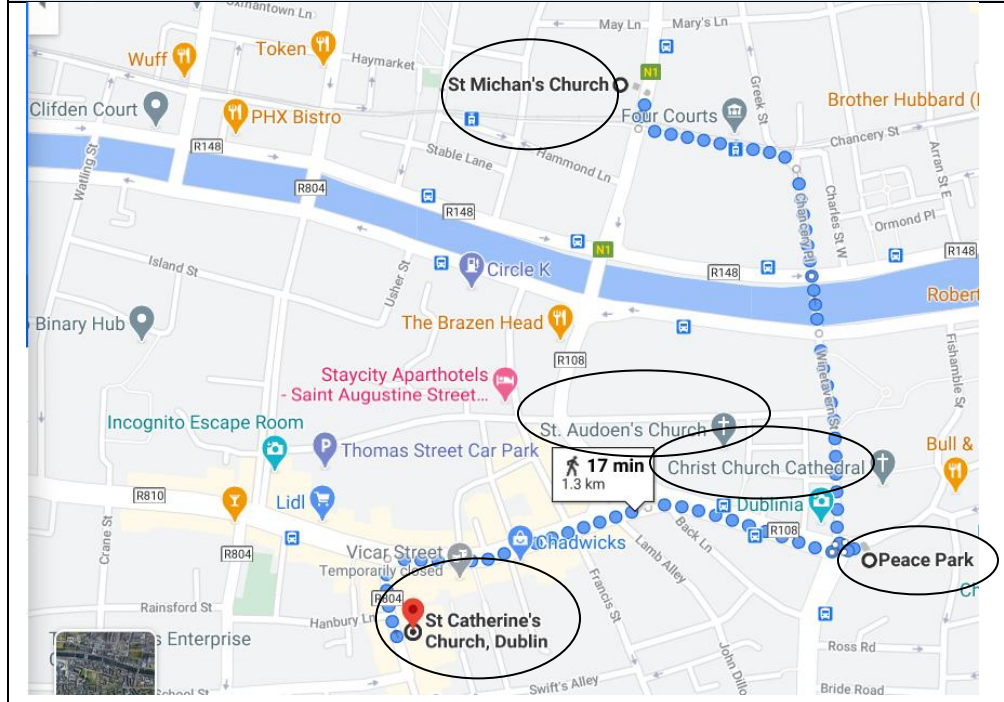

<p><b>St Mary's Church of Ireland</b>  <b>Edward Pue</b> d. 1729</p>	<p>Located on the corner of Mary Street and Jervis Street and adjacent to Wolfe Tone Square. From the 17th century the church was a place of worship for parishioners on Dublin's north-side; closed in 1986. The church has since been deconsecrated and the building is now a pub and restaurant. The parish also had a chapel of ease - St Mary's - off Dorset Street, more commonly known as "The Black Church".</p>

**South Side COI Churches**

These South side churches were in close proximity of each other.

It's a ten-minute walk from **St Michans** (north side of the river and actually St Paul's) to Peace Park, the location of previous **St Nicholas Within**. From **St Michans** to **St Catherine's** it would have been a twelve- minute walk and to **St Audeon** 8-10 minutes.

These four churches were close together and it may be reasonable to assume the Pues are related.

**St Audoen**- south of the Liffey, erected in 1190, oldest parish church in Dublin

**St Catherines** (Thomas Street)- -Dawson Street

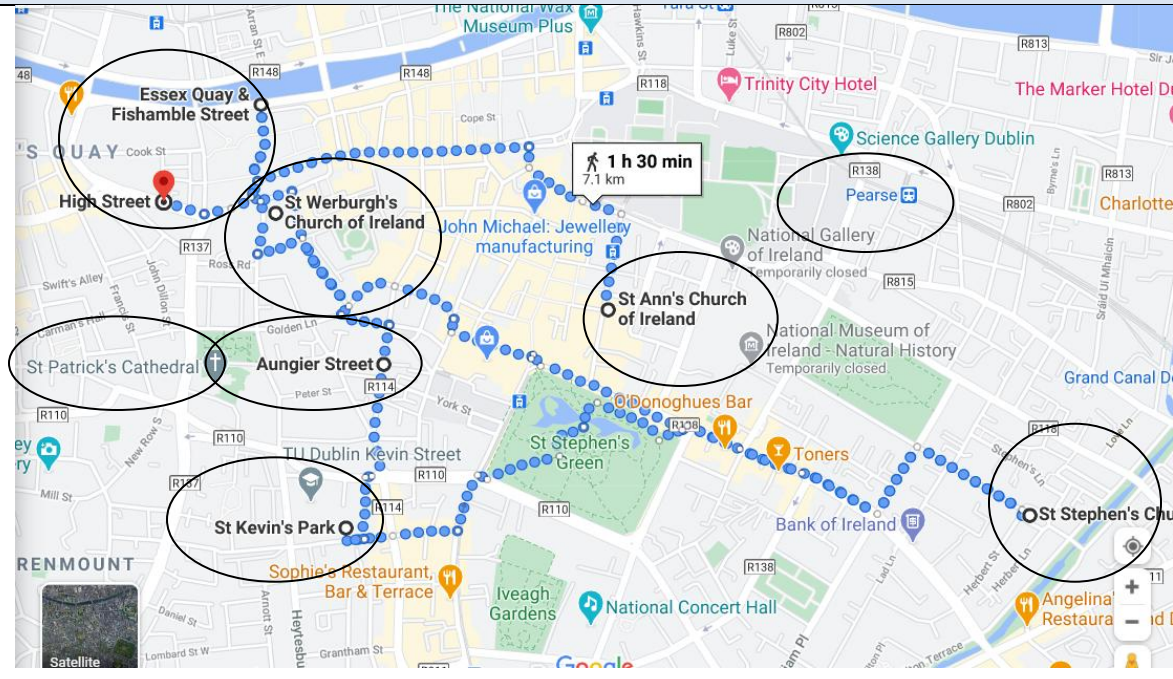

## \*\*\*St. Luke's Church, Dublin

In 1708, an act of parliament was passed, dividing the parish of St. Nicholas Without and giving part of it the denomination of St. Luke's. A glebe house was erected on The Coombe for the vicar, who was nominated by the Chapter of St. Patrick's Cathedral, and the church of St. Luke erected not far from the Glebe.

It has been said that the church was built mainly for the benefit of the conformist French Huguenot weavers who lived in the neighborhood. However, very few, if any, French names appeared in the parish registers from this time - the Huguenots had their own place of worship in a chapel in nearby St. Patrick's Cathedral. However, there was a huge influx of weavers and others associated with the silk and poplin industries and cotton and wool manufacture. **St John's Church of the Evangelist Fishamble Street**- built in 1168 and in 1878 merged with **St Werburgh**. It was founded in the 12th century, and many of its parish records survive.  
**St Werburghs** -close to St Anne's Church of Ireland  
St James, former church on James Street, established 1710  
**St. Michael's Church** was a **Roman Catholic** and later **Church of Ireland** church which was located in **High Street, Dublin, Ireland**.

1 **Margaret Pue**, widower, died 1748

2. **William** (1777-1856) **Pugh** died in the South Dublin workhouse. He was in 2 times in 1855 and then finally 1856 when he died. Wife Mary was in the Workhouse with him in 1855- she was 46 and he was 79. They were Protestant and he was a seaman.

3. **Henry Pugh** m Mary Walsh in 1832, **dob app 1800**.

4. **Ellen Pugh**- widow on 1901 census **dob app 1853**

5. **Robert Pugh** and Mary, b 1835 in **Wales**.
