

Dublin Pugh-Pew-Pue-Phew-Pues - R. C. What we know and what we don't know.

Families: The following are in the Dublin Tree

Three families, not sure if or how they are related, but all in the same Parish. Abraham, Andrew and Peter.

Abraham¹Pugh (1787-1857) and wife Betty/Bridget? (1788-1858). Records found for Abraham and Betty at the Parish of St Marks. At first I thought they were COI, but then I realized it is the Parish, not the Church. Assuming they are the parents of Abraham m to Bridget born **app 1810**. He died on **Townsend** and so did she. **Occupation:** unknown.

There is an unknown Abraham Pew that died 1729, father, in St Paul's.

The family started on Townsend Street in Dublin. Did they have any other children?

According to Rachel Vaughey in Ancestry, his father is William (Gullemi) Pugh from England, married to Elizabeth Morgan. Baptism records are RC "non-conformist" in England 1789- private ceremony "pericuto Mortis -in danger of death". Another record shows Church of England Dec 5, 1790.

Rachey Vaughey, EamonSimpson and Mary Jane Wood have not taken a test or is not a match.

Abraham²Pugh **dob app 1810** and Bridget. **Occupation:** unknown. They had 3 children per ancestry tree by Racheljosullivan.
 1. William (1830-1905), baptized at St Mary's Pro-Cathedral, born on **Georges St**.
 2. Henry (1833-1833)
 3. Elizabeth (1835-1923) married to John Keough, living on **Townsend** in 1865.
 4. Abraham (1838/1843-1892) who was born on **Townsend**. Elizabeth, Henry and Abraham were baptized at St Andrews. Birth records do not match death records.

Census records have Elizabeth born in Wicklow and Kildare but I believe those are not correct. Death records not found on Abraham and Bridget.

1851 Ebrahim **Pugh St Mitchel's Court**, St Mark's Parish The 1851 Dublin Census Could also be Abraham¹

Townsend Street- this family lived on this street from 1857-1907.

1857 and 1858 Betty and Abraham¹
 1838 Abraham³, born to Abraham ²
 1852 Abraham³ living here when he was in trouble for rioting
 1861 William living here when he married Mary
 1861 Abraham ³ married to Mary Anne Dunne
 1865 Elizabeth's son is born

 1906-1907 Ellen, 2nd wife of William living here off and on.
 After this the family seems to have moved.

Did they start living on **Townsend** street after Betty and Abraham died?
 Later- John Christopher and Charlotte Bryan are living on **Townsend** in 1936, son of Francis and Lizzie Osborne/son of Peter and Anne Kelly. In 1903 his uncle Patrick and wife Mary Byrne are living there. I have not found a connection between this family and the "Abraham" family. Also, Thomas, son of Alice and John Curran, of the glassmaker family, is living there in 1904. May be coincidence.

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<p>William³Pugh/Abraham/Abraham b in 1830, had two wives, Mary Bryan and Ellen Geoghegan. His children were all with Mary <u>Abraham</u> (1861-1911) <u>Bridget</u> (1863- unk) <u>John</u> (1864-unk). William was born on Georges Street, lived on Townsend Street when he married Mary. Children born on Petersons Lane. After that he moved to Dowling Street prior to marriage to his 2nd wife. Occupation on Abraham and Mary's civil marriage record was laborer.</p>	<p>No death date for Mary, assuming it is prior to his marriage with Ellen..</p>
<p>1901 Census- she is widowed, working as a servant, address Clontarf. Document from the Local Government Board for Ireland that reads "Letter from Mr Browne? Rate collector, dated 13 Dec 1892 in reference to Mr. Pugh, Clontarf, who he thought was a caretaker in the premises but who was in possession as occupier at the time the rates were struck. Ordered that the £ 2.4.0 be paid. Possibly William? FMP 6 Feb 1905 From the Dublin Poor Law Union Boards of Guardians Minute Books. Clerk Parish of Glasgow Union. Forwarding copies of warrants for the removal of Helen Goeghan or Pugh and Thos Kerwin to this union. There was an Ellen 1847-1913 who was in and out of the South Dublin WH 1905-1906, addresses Townsend Street, Petersons Lane. Could be his 2nd wife.</p>	
<p>Ellen Geoghegan- probably Ellen from the workhouse records* South Dublin Union Ellen Pugh 1847-1913 Age at death 66-widowed, died in workhouse, address Asylum Yard. Not in census records- a charwoman is a cleaning woman, probably an occupation for a lot of widows. Her age is not always the same, but that is not unusual. The dates that are different have the same description for her and address of Mcguinness. Even if these are not all her records, it seems clear she has been in and out of the workhouse from 1905-1907. 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<p>William's descendants: Abraham Joseph Pugh⁴1861 m Mary Ann Coffrey/Caffrey- I found records for 11 children. <u>Mary Ellen</u> (1890-1902) <u>Elizabeth</u> (1892-1918) <u>William Jeffrey</u> (1894-1957) m Maria Norton <u>Abraham</u> (1896-1897) <u>Christopher</u> (1898-1916) who died in France <u>Cathrine</u> (1901-1925) <u>Mathew</u> (1902-1924) <u>Abraham</u> (1904-1929) <u>Mary Anne</u> (1907-1925) <u>Patrick</u> (1909-1929). Address when he died was Fenian Street. <u>John</u> (1911-?) Mary Anne died in 1911 at the age of 40, probably after birth of John.</p>	<p>Abraham's death date is unknown. They lived on Cumberland when they first married and on Denzille in 1901 and 1911. The only child that lived past age 25 was William Jeffrey. Mary died in 1911 at the age of 44.</p> <p>Occupation: Abraham was a general laborer on 1901 census and a mineral water bottler on the 1911 census and on their civil marriage records it says he is a soda water maker. On children's records he is also a mineral water bottler and on death records a packer. There is a discrepancy on the death records, dob 1871, but he died on Fenian Street. Other records: 1908 Abraham Pugh 19 Denzille Street, Trinity, Division 3, St Stephen's Green, Dublin Electoral Rolls.</p>
<p>William Jeffrey/Geoffrey Pugh⁵ (1894-1957) m Maria Norton 1914. They had three children: <u>Bridget</u> (1918-unk) m Christopher Fennell <u>Abraham Augustus</u> (1920) <u>Esther</u> (1924-1925) <u>Catherine</u> (1928-2008) married James O'Loughlin <u>Joseph</u> (1932-unk) They lived on Parnell when Bridget and Esther were born. Occupation: laborer.</p>	
<p>Abraham³ Pugh/Abraham/Abraham - 1838/1843 m Mary Anne Dunne. He was a sailor, died of cancer of the tongue and throat. He was sent to Bridewell prison for shouting and rioting in 1852 when he was 14 years old. He lived on Townsend at that time. They had 7 children. <u>Sarah Ann</u> (1866-1945) m. Patrick O'Connor <u>William</u> (1869-unk) <u>Mary M</u> (1872-1891) <u>Peter</u> (1874-1913) m. Marg McCann</p>	<p>Mary A Pugh 1838 Age 40 wife of a sailor, RC, Poolbeg street 1878 This is Mary Dunne. She was sent to a Lunatic Asylum 1878- this was the same year she had Bridget- possibly post-partum depression?</p>

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<p><u>Elizabeth</u> (1876-1877) <u>Brigid</u> (1878- unk). They lived in a few places. First daughter was born on Mark Street. Bridget, Mary M, Elizabeth and Peter were born on Poolbeg Street (1872-1878). Abraham died on Tyrone Street, as did his daughter Mary in 1892.</p>	
<p>Abraham's Family Peter ⁴ Pugh m Margarita Maria McCann in 1894 and they had 7 children. <u>Mollie</u> (1894-1966) m. Robert Simpson <u>Sarah Ann</u> (1899-1973) m. Henry Turner <u>Elizabeth Josephine</u> (1899-1971) m Henry Matthews <u>Agatha Margaret</u> (1902-2004) m William Behan <u>Patrick Joseph</u> (1905-1981) married Anne Harold <u>Abraham Valentine</u> (1908-1908) <u>Josephine Christina</u> (1910-2003) m. William Beasley. Occupation: Peter was a sailor like his father. They lived on Lower Gloucester when their first daughter was born in 1894. They were on Upper Cumberland on the 1901 census record-Sarah and Elizabeth were born there (1897-1901). Agatha, Patrick, Abraham and Josephine were born on Gardiner(1902-1910), where they were in the 1911 census. Daughter Molly's address was Gardiner when she married in 1915. Peter died at sea in 1913 according to Ancestry. He was 39. Marriage record said "Peter Pugh of Dublin and Glasgow south- assuming he sailed between Ireland and Scotland?" Margarita (1875-) was 38 when she was widowed, with six children.</p>	
<p>Names of Pughs who signed the William Obrien Petition 1848-1849 <u>William</u>-possibly son of Abraham? B 1830 Dublin Tree <u>Michael</u> -possibly son of John Pue and Ellen Scott? Glassmaker/Dublin <u>Peter</u>-possibly Peter married to Anne Kelly (b 1800) or his son b 1836 Dublin Tree</p>

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I added the family of Andrew Pew in the Ancestry tree, but I cannot find how they are related to Abraham. They were all in the same parish. However there is no one in Andrew's family named Abraham and that seems to be a trend. Most likely originated in Wicklow.

Esther **Pue**¹, Find a Grave. Born 1756, died 1846, buried in Glasnevin Cemetery- son Andrew/born Wicklow.

Andrew Pue/Pugh/Pughe² (1798-1856) – per Ask a Grave he is the husband to Jane Pugh, marriage records show her to be Jane Byrne. Children listed are Mary Reid King, John and James. **John and James Joseph** must have been twins, born and died 1851. He would have been 58 when the twins were born. Buried in Glasnevin Cemetery. Land records show him in 1821 and 1851 with Ann Pugh. I suspect he was married three times- once in Wicklow and twice in Dublin.

“Andrew was born in Wicklow. He came to Dublin in his twenties. He was the first to live in **Clarence Place** and his descendents lived there until at least 1942”

Andrew had a sponsor named Francis Pugh for his son James Joseph. Probably son of Peter, born 1833. Another possible connection as to why they are brothers.

There is a Petty Sesson Record with Mathew, a Dairy Man who lived in Westland Row, “wife of Mathew Pugh, **Dairyman**, residing in Westlund Row, being supported as a pauper/immediate steps be taken to compel Mr. Pugh to maintain his wife and to defray the expenses incurred by the union for her support. May 25, 1842” Based on the information above, I believe he is related to the Dairyman in Dublin.

<p>The Weekly Freeman's Journal March 2, 1850 Fire in Lime- Street Destruction Of Dairy Cattle And Other Property A fire broke out in this neighborhood on yesterday, in an extensive dairy yard, in which were stalled some thirty-four head of cattle, comprising thirty milch cows, four heifers, besides calves and draught horses. Besides the livestock there was also on the premises a large quantity of prime hay in stack (about twenty tons), a large stack of straw, together with a stack of dairy requisites, feeding apparatus, etc. The concern, as it was afterwards ascertained, was rented jointly by two parties- Mrs. Pugh, a widow, in struggling circumstances, keeping a dairy shop in Clarence-place, and John Doyle, an [sic] humble, industrious man, keeping also a dairy in Clarence-lane. Of the cattle which were kept in the yard, the man, Doyle, was the owner of fifteen milch cows, two heifers, and a calf or two. The rest of the cattle, amounting to about eighteen fine milch cows, were the property of the Widow Pugh No sooner had the alarm been given than messengers were sent off for the engines. So rapid was the progress of the flames that before the assistance in any shape could be rendered the whole premises were in one mass of flames. Delay occurred in rendering assistance, the outer gate of the premises being locked, and the boy in charge having gone for wash and grains for the cattle. Meanwhile the flames spread with amazing rapidity. A way was broken in through one of the adjoining houses by the police; but, unfortunately before any effective aid could be procured the</p>	

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entire range of stables was in one mass of flames. The stalls were built against the wall, and were formed of wood, and all thatched with straw; and the poor animals being confined with chain head-stalls and halters, we're literally roasted to death.

In the inner part of the yard were two stacks of hay; and it certainly looks strange that the hay was found simultaneously in a blaze along with other parts of the premises at some distance from it. It is a strange coincidence that some fourteen years ago this very yard, then a dairy-yard too, was the scene of a fire, in which human life was lost, attested by several of the neighbors.

We ascertained with regret that not one penny of the property has been insured. The damage done is estimated at 400 L.

1850 Poor Law Records of South Dublin. "Anne Pugh begging remission of rate on account of her property and cows being destroyed by fire.

The Board cannot interfere." **Assuming this is Peter's Wife.**

Francis²Pew/Peugh, Phew, Pughe, Peughe/Pugh 1833, m Anne Floyd in 1851 (address unknown). They lived at **Queens Terrace** for birth of Ellen in 1858. They lived in **Hughes Cottage** from 1854-1856. Patrick is born in County Louth in 1865 and Francis is born back on **Clarence Street** at the end of 1865. Francis died in 1895 in the South Dublin workhouse, address **Brunswick**. Francis had senile dementia.

In the 1901 census Ellen is living with her daughter Mary on **Queens Terrace, South Dock** listed as a shop keeper. **Occupation: Dairy Man**

Anne (1856-unk) m. Henry Moore in 1880/address **Hughes Cottage**

Ellen (1858-1900), m George Thompson-born at **11 Queen's Terrace**

Patrick 1865-1906, m Margaret Ohara 1886, address **2 Hughes Cottage.**

Francis (1865-1911) m. Elizabeth Osborne -**born on Clarence Street**

Margaret 1868 m to Michael Murray in 1908 at age 47 (he was a widower)

John 1872-1879 both born at **2 Hughes Cottages.**

Anne's death records in 1905 say widow of a dairy man.

Patrick and Frances do not appear to be twins.

Patrick is born in County Louth, probably Jan of that year.

Their son Francis lived on **Brunswick** when he married in 1897 and daughter Mary is living on **Brunswick** when she marries.

1911 Annie Pugh, Age 6, lives on **Wentworth Place.**

Entered North Dublin Union WH. She is with Margaret, her mother. Sent to Industrial School Aug 12, 1911

In 1911 Marg lives on **Wentworth Place**, and has 4 children living with her. Fanne 7, Ellen 14, Peter 19, and Kate 27, who has been married for 2 years and

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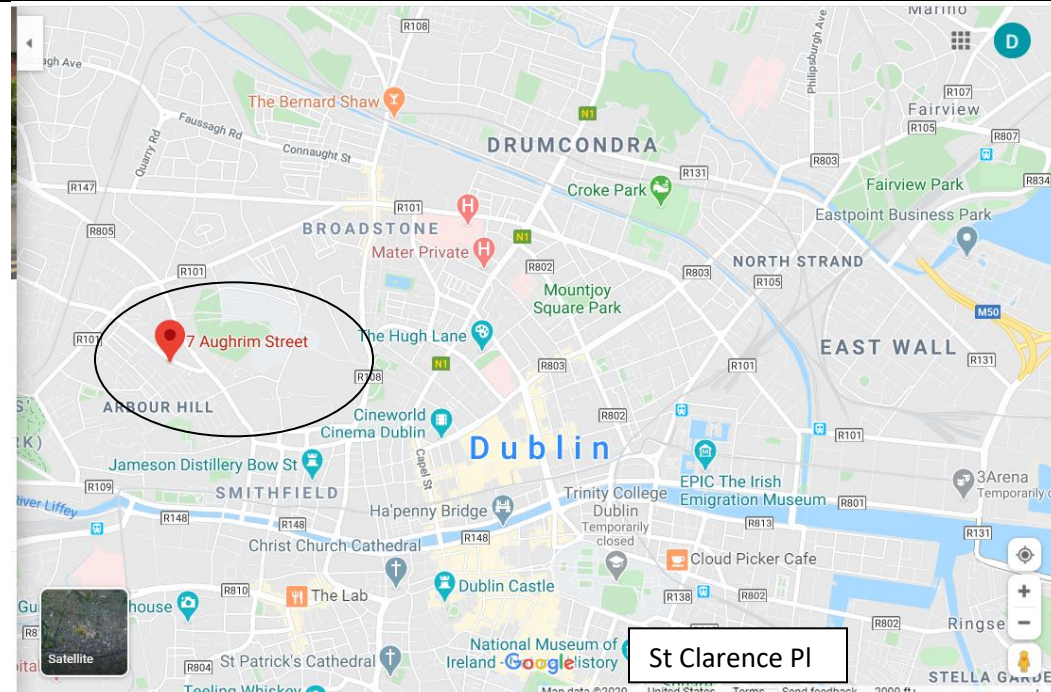

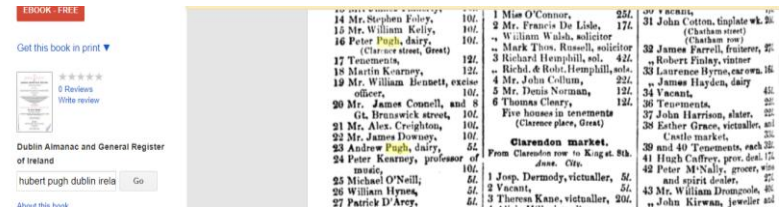

Peter Pugh and Andrew Pugh were in the dairy business. They lived on Clarence Street Great, per Dublin Almanac and General Register of Ireland 1847. Assuming they are brothers. How are they related to Francis below, who also lived on Clarence. Another brother?



The William Smith O'Brien Petition (from Find My Past)

Despite being the younger son of Baron Inchiquin, he was a political radical. His family were well established political conservatives and supporters of the Orange order. William was an MP, but he joined Daniel O'Connell's Repeal movement in 1843, which sought to overturn the Act of Union. However, he did not think they were radical enough and he joined the revolutionary Young Irelanders in 1846 as they were committed to Irish independence. On 29th July 1848 William led an abortive uprising in Ballingarry, Co. Tipperary, otherwise known as 'the battle of Widow McCormack's Cabbage patch'. He was arrested on 6th August 1848 for his part in this "rebellion" and tried for high treason at a special sitting of the district court at Clonmel, Co. Tipperary.

The William Smith O'Brien Petition was signed by **Francis Pugh 1848 (Clarence Street)** and **Michael Pugh (Francis Street)** and **Peter**

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Pugh (Clarence Street), to plead for clemency, and was signed by people all over Ireland. On 5th June 1849 Smith O'Brien's death sentence was commuted to transportation to Australia for life. He was transported to Van Dieman's Land in 1854 and was granted a conditional pardon, on the basis that he not return to Ireland. He received a full pardon two years later, and briefly returned to Ireland. He died in Bangor, Caernarvonshire, Wales, on 18th June 1864.

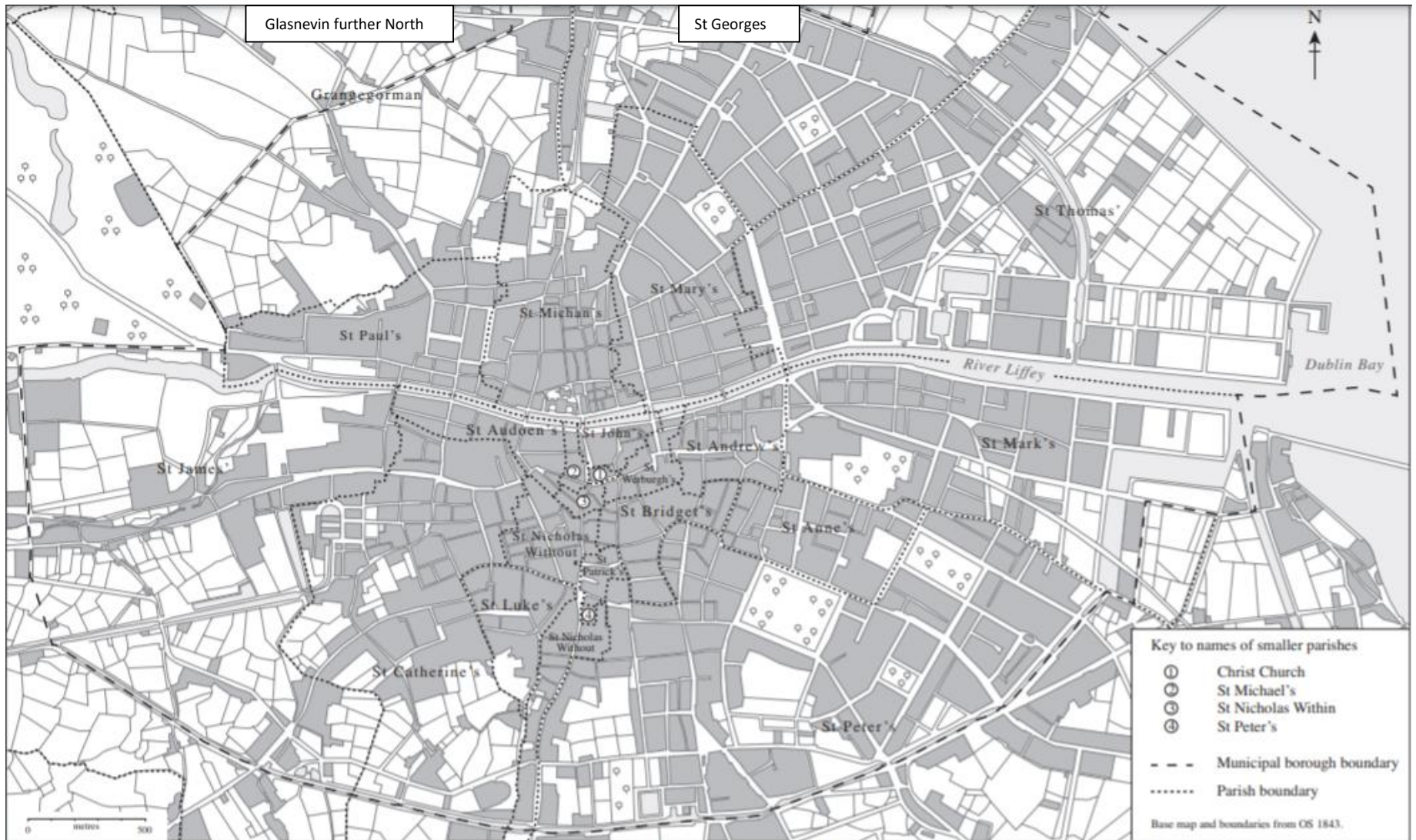


Fig. 2 Dublin city parishes, 1843
