Joseph Francis Pugh (1850-1888) married Mary McKeown in 1875. His father was John, a carding master (in charge of the carding room in a mill) and his mother was Susan. They had a son <u>John Francis</u> 1876-1893. Joseph's occupation was a **Physician** according to John Francis's birth records. They apparently divorced in 1885; at least they were in the process according to newspapers. One of the newspapers reported Joseph was working as a physician occasionally in Belfast. Both Joseph and son John died of TB. They were RC. His records say he died in the Belfast Workhouse as a shop assistant. He did have a will and he left his personal estate to wife Mary.

Pue/Pew-earliest- in Belfast (Shanikill was the original name for Belfast) The rest appear to be COL

- 1. **John Pue** and Mary Dick, dob app 1730. Children: Mary b.1752, John 1754, and Elizabeth b 1764, St Anne's, Belfast
- 2. William Pew and Charlotte Thomsen dob appt 1780 daughter Ann Jane-records show she was born out of wedlock in 1812 in Ballinderry
- 3. Mary Pugh 1812-1887, widow of John, parchment maker
- 4. **John Pue** dob app 1840, m. to Izamenin Quigley-son <u>John</u> 1868. In ancestry there is an Izamenin Quigley who married a John Peel in 1864; they had <u>Henry</u>, <u>Margaret</u>, <u>James</u> and <u>Ann</u>. Maybe this should be Peel, not Pue. He was a **shoemaker** and lived on <u>Townsend Street</u>. Married at Christ Church. Also shows up in Down records.
- 5. **Robert Pugh** dob app 1840 and Unknown, father of <u>James Pugh</u> who died in 1916 after a torpedo hit the S.S Englishman in the Irish Sea. Son's address was <u>Larne</u>
- 6. James Edmund Pugh (1844-1896), m to Mary Elizabeth Naylor, m in 1875 in Dublin. Occupation: Mason/iron monger/merchant, and is in the Free Mason records. They have two sons John Charles Pugh (1876-?) and William James Pugh (1879-?) who married Anna Maria Maniece-he is an accountant. James Edmund shows up in ship records, he goes back and forth as a merchant.
- There is a **John Pew** living in Shankill Parish in Griffiths. dob app 1830. James Edmund Pugh died on Shanikill Road- father John on his marriage records. Assuming that is his father.
- 7. **James Pue**, farmer, dob app 1850, daughter Margaret Pue, married Joseph Thompson 1875. She is from Castlewellen which is in Down.
- 8. **Charles Pugh** dob app1850 m Catherine Ross. They have a daughter <u>Catherine Isabella</u> (1881-1882). Charles is a van-man or a "Hotel Boot" at Queens Hotel- servants, cleans boots, runs errands. Queens Hotel- corner of York and Donegal Street
- 9. Thomas **Williams** Pugh dob appt 1860 m Mary Hutton, they had Margaret Isabella (1889-?) and Edward Williams (1886-?). He is an accountant. Possibly related to William James above, who is also an accountant.
- 10. Eli Pugh dob app 1860- boilermaker, daughter Amy, married Thomas Leeson -a joiner (does not seem to fit a naming pattern).

Unknown

Richard Pugh UNK 1847-1874 died in the WH, was a **fitter**.

Lesley Pews 1826-1896, son of Samuel Pews. He was a laborer, his father also. His wife was a widow.

Mary Pews-1844-1899 Larne

Appears to be 3 Roberts according to land records.

- 1. Robert Pugh 1821-Franklin Place-"2" dob app 1800
- 2. Robert Pew Census and Valuation for 1838 Fall Road, Townparks, Shanikill Parish dob app 1810
- 3. Robert Pugh census of 1851 Londonderry Borough. dob app 1830

Also a Robert Pugh working as an excise man in Belfast


None of the above are in Griffiths, with the exception of John Pew Parish of Shanikill living on Dock Townparks Union Place North. Possibly Robert's son.

Larne is where James Pugh (1874-1916) lived before dying on the SS Englishman. His father was Robert, dob app 1850

Holywood-Mary Pugh 1812-1887, widow of John, parchment maker



5. **Thomas Pugh** (assuming it is the one born in 1882) married Dorcas Gallery in 1911 and they have three children- William (1912-?), Thomas (1916-?), and Mary Ann (1921-?). William was born in Umgola which is just outside of the town of Armagh. He is listed as a railway porter on the GNR. His mother Mary died in 1937. Thomas died in 1965 naming William Pugh as administrator in his will.

- 1. **Henry Pew** Gent. Died in 1686 in Glasslogh, Co Armaghapparently now County Monaghan. Also William, Ensign, killed in 1641. See Monaghan
- 2. **Mary Pue** and Edward McGuire marriage bonds COI 1775 dob app 1750
- 3. **Henry Pugh** 1779-1846 Butler, Castledillon- near city of Armagh
- 4. **Thomas Pugh** dob app 1825- a green grocer, sold fruits and vegetables-his son <u>Thomas</u> was born app 1850, he married Mary Ann Mcgahey d 1937. He is listed as a soldier-Corp in the 94 Regt when they marry in 1880. Their son <u>Thomas</u> was born in 1882 in East India. He died before 1911. Most of the Irish who were in India in the early phases of the British occupation went there in the military or civilian service of the London-based East India Company" https://www.historyireland.com/20th-century-contemporary-history/nabobs-soldiers-and-imperial-service-the-irish-in-india/

There was a railway station that opened in 1858, part of the Ulster Railway. That merged with the Irish North Western Railway and the Northern Railway of Ireland in 1876 to form the Great Northern Railway (GNR)https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Glaslough

6. **Amelia Pugh** married Isaac Harrison, a Salvation Army Officer living in Portadown. Apparently, Salvation Army officers must devote full time to Army work, per Wikipedia. Added to soldiers and sailor file.

Most families in Armagh appear to be Church of Ireland

- 1 **Pat Pughe** DOB app 1800 m to Margar Reilly Lugan Parish/Also know as Virginia, RC, Kilmore, Cavan daughter Brigm. B 1838.
- 2.**Kate Pugh** was found in a will, sister Eliza Clarke, from Wales-1888?
- 3. **George Pugh** (1917-1959) married to Teresa O'Reilly 1947 lived in Munlough (Munlough is just south of Bawnboy) "from Scotland". He was a bricklayer. They were RC
- 3. **Terrance Pugh** b. 1955, mother O'Reilly

There was also a **Michael Pugh**, subconstable of Brackley the Parish of Templeport. Brackley (between Bawnboy and Swanlinbar), years 1853-1855 and Bailieborough in 1858.

Very few Pughs in Cavan. Pat Pughe was RC, George from Scotland was Catholic, Kate was from Wales, most likely Protestant. Too few people to pick up a naming pattern, apparently a lot of Reilly/O'Reilly's. A lot of crossover into County Donegal and County Longford.

Derry/Londonderry

Londonderry: At the time of the plantation of Ulster (around 1613), the City of London sent master-builders (guilds) and money to rebuild the ruined medieval town hence the name Londonderry. The modern city preserves the 17th-century layout of four main streets radiating from the Diamond to four gateways - Bishop's Gate, Ferryquay Gate, Shipquay Gate and Butcher's Gate. The Guildhall, looking much like its counterpart in London, is just outside the walls.

The main thoroughfare, Shipquay Street, is very steep, with narrow little streets running off it and a craft village tucked in behind the O'Doherty tower. From the quay behind the Guildhall hundreds of thousands of Irish emigrants sailed to a new life in the New World. http://www.geographia.com/northern-ireland/ukider00.htm

The earliest Pew church records in Derry were found in **St Columbs records**.

Robert Pew and Mary Royal m 1732 (DOB 1700) COI- daughters <u>Dorrity</u> and <u>Ann</u>, son <u>Thomas</u>.


Dorrity and Thomas died as children.

Probably the Robert Pew in the 1740 Protestant Householder List.

St Columb's Cathedral in the walled city of Derry, County Londonderry, Northern Ireland is the mother church of the Church of Ireland Diocese of Derry and **Raphoe** and the parish church of **Templemore**, the first cathedral built by the Anglican church after the Reformation in the British Isles and the first non-RC cathedral to be built in Western Europe.

Dedicated to Saint Columba, the Irish monk who established a Christian settlement in the area before being exiled from Ireland and introducing Christianity to Scotland and northern England. The original site of the diocesan cathedral was in **Templemore** (Irish: "the Big Church"). https://zims-en.kiwix.campusafrica.gos.orange.com/wikipedia en all nopic/A/St Columb's Cathedral

Richard Pew, born 1848 to Richard Pew and Ellen Preston, father was excise officer, e.g. taxes St Columbs
Jane Pugh (sister to Arthur Pugh Esq. from Mayo) married Nathan Stewart at St Columbs.

<u>1740 Protestant Householders Lists</u> Robert Pew Civil Parrish Nr Derry District: Templemore (does not fit into Arthur Esq's tree).

<u>1766 Religious Census</u> **Samuel Pue** Protestant-Parish Magherafelt, Diocese Armagh, County Londonderry. The name is very prevalent in the Derry Pews, but he is on the other side of the county.

Joseph Pewes 1831 Census Tamnimore, Clondermot
Tamnymore is in the Electoral Division of Londonderry No. 5 Urban, in Civil Parish of Clondermot, in the Townland of Tirkeeran-Tamneymore- House no.: 19; No. of males: 2; (2x Joseph); No. of females: 4; No. of Roman Catholics: 6-could this be a mistake? Seems unlikely.

Griffiths Joseph Pews and **Martha** Pews- Strabane Old Road, Clondermot – which leads me to think **Joseph Sr** died before 1858, left the land to **Martha** and **son Joseph**?

James Pew 1832 <u>Valuation Office Books</u>, <u>Edenballeymore</u>, Templemore. Edenballymore lies to the north of Derry

Records for **Matty Pew** Unk-1768-1868 in Londonderry- no specific information. There is a Mathew born in 1860, wondering if there is a family connection due to naming pattern.

1 Joseph Pews¹ dob app 1800-bef 1858. Occupation laborer. Wife possibly Martha. Son <u>Samuel</u> dob 1828 according to his marriage record. Assuming the following are also his sons due to proximity and naming patterns: **Joseph²** dob app 1820 **William¹** dob app 1825 and **James¹** dob app 1830

2. James dob app 1800- possibly the brother to Joseph¹

James Pew 1832 Valuation Office Books, Edenballeymore, Templemore. Edenballymore lies to the north of Derry

Children of Joseph¹ 1800

1 There is a **Joseph**²/**Joseph**¹ dob app 1820, per the Ward Family tree he is married to Ann and they have a son named <u>Samuel</u> (1841-1913) per rootsireland.ie. Occupation **laborer**.

According to the originator of the Ward Family Tree, RobertaMaryWard, they added an L to the name-"Plew"

"I was informed by my father Robert Plews that one of his ancestors was a minister and the name was then Pews -On a trip to Manchester he noticed a billboard with details of Plews matches so he added the letter L to his name"

2 William¹ Pews/Joseph¹ 1825-1880 m. Margaret Crossan. He is a laborer. Address Fountain Hill when he died. I believe they had the following children:

Mary Pews (1845-?) m Robert Campbell COI- suspect she is daughter to William/address Fountain Hill when she married

Joseph Pughs b 1847, no parents named, but suspect he is part of this family based on name and date.

William² Pew/Pews 1850 married Mary Kyle, address Fountain Hill. COI

Anne Pughes, born 1852-1876. Per death records her brother Alexander was with her. She lived on Dungiven Road.

Margaret Pews (1858-?) m Joseph McIntyre, father William, laborer- married in the RC church.

Alexander Pews, (1862-?) father William Pews laborer, m Dorcus Steele 1892. Presbyterian

Wm and Mary had an unnamed male Pews born in 1864.

James Pews (1869-1875), son of Margaret, died in the WH, "child of a pauper".

Thomas Pews (1872-1880) and Samuel Pews 1874 born to Margaret Pews in the workhouse and apparently died in the workhouse, age 2.

According to William Pews death record, he was a widower. His son William was present at death. He had been paralyzed for 6 months. However there is a death record for Margaret Pews, died 1887, son Alexander present at death, address for both Moore Street so I suspect that is not correct.

3 Samuel¹/Joseph¹ Pews- dob app 1828, m. Mary Steen 1849- they lived on Fountain Hill when son James was born. They were Presbyterian. Occupation: **laborer.** Samuel's first wife Mary Steen died in 1878 and he remarried Isabella Kyle (1846-1919) in 1884. They had the following children:

<u>James b 1865</u> m Margaret McLaughlin, they lived on <u>Dungiven Road and later end up in Scotland</u>.

William dob app 1869 m Mary Hassen, address also Dungiven Road. Occupation laborer.

4 James¹/**Joseph Pews** dob app 1830 m. Ann Trainer. Their family had the address of Fountain Hill. They had the following children:

Mathew Pew (1860-?) Parish Long Tower RC

Samuel Pews (1865-bef 1870), born in the WH

James Lafferty Pews (1867-) address Fountain Hill

Samuel Doherty Pews (1870-1870) address Fountain Hill

Charlotte Pews (1871-1873-died in the workhouse) address Fountain Hill

Jane Wallace Pews (1874-1875) address Cross Street at birth and Bonds field at death

Mathew is the only child with both names on the birth record and is baptized, all the rest simply list "Annie Pews" on the civil records. No death records or census records found for James or Ann. Mathew was baptized R.C.

Samuel¹ Pews/Plews son **of Joseph²** b 1841 married Margaret Jane Murdock in 1874. They were **Presbyterian.** Their address is **Spencer Road**. He was a **saddler**. He is found in 1894 Slaters described as a saddler and harness maker.

His dad is also listed as Frederick on his marriage record, but I think that is an error. He is clearly the son of Samuel as his father was a saddler. COI John Pews (1883-?) m Mary Thompson. Address Spencer Rd. COI Florence (1883-?) twin of John's, m John Joseph Doherty Address Spencer Rd at birth, name was Plews on her marriage record. RC Samuel Pews (1886-?) b on Spencer Road Frances Pews/Plews (1889-1989) m Thomas McElhinney 1910 address

Some records show Samuel married to Maggie Grey, but on line ancestry trees have Maggie Grey as the mother of Marg Murdock. Suspect error.

Maude- Margaret Grey Sponsor or informant Robert- Margaret Grey present at birth 1879- NR- Margaret Grey listed as mother John - Margaret Grey Sponsor or informant Florence - Margaret Grey Sponsor or informant

Francis- they have Margaret Grey listed as mother and Margaret Pews witness.

Samuel **Plews** was living with son Frederick in 1911. Dunfield Terrace. He is a widow. Frederick is a clerk in a pork store.

Names start out as Pews/Phews and end up Plews. Started on Spencer Rd.

William² Pews/William¹/Joseph¹ (laborer/Porter) and Mary Kyle had the following children:

Margaret Pews (1876-1876) father William, on Bridge Street

Elizabeth Pughes/Pews (1878-?) m Forest Doherty, b on Murray's Row COI

Samuel George Pughs (1880-?) m Annie Gormley/Gourley, address Drumahoe COI

<u>William Pughs/Plews</u> (1883) m Elizabeth Campbell 1912 Clooney Parish-mother's last name not spelled correctly address <u>Drumahoe James Pugh/Pughs</u> (1886-?) m Elizabeth Logan 1910, address <u>Drumahoe</u>

Mary Jane Pughes (1888-1891) 2 yrs and 10 month died in the workhouse, aunt Annie Pughes present at time of death, address Drumahoe

Anne Pughs (1891-?) address Drumahoe

Alexander Pews (1894-?) address Drumahoe

Pughs on census in 1901(Drumhoe/Waterside) and Plews 1911.

Alexander Pews/Plews/William¹/Joseph¹, (1862-bef 1930?) m. Dorcus Steele in 1892. He was a blacksmith/gas inspector/examiner and was Presbyterian. Living on Mill Street in the 1921/1930 Derry Almanac. Children of Alexander and Dorcus Steele:

William George Plews 1894 address Gordon Terrace, awarded a metal as a Merchant Seaman 1914-1925. He was a Marine Engineer-d 1965

Dorcus Plews 1896 address Gordon Terrace, married James George Burn from County Louth 1930 COI, father is deceased

Mathew Chambers Plews 1898 address Gordon Terrace, father is a black smith

Margaret Plews 1901 address Gordon Terrace, father is a smith

Mary Pews 1903 address Gas Work, Irish Street, father is a gas examiner

Alexander Pews 1904 address Gas yard, father is a gas inspector

Mathilda Pews 1906 address Mill Street, father is a gas inspector

Robert Steele Plews 1909 address Gas Work, father is a black smith d 1910

Jane 1911 address Gas Work, father is a black smith

Thomas Hamilton 1913 address Gas Work, father is a black smith (they used coal to make gas?)

James Pews/Samuel¹/Joseph¹ and Margaret McLaughlin m 1894 address The Cottage Dungavin Road, Presbyterian Laborer

Living on Windmill Terrace in 1901. Children of James Pews and Margaret McLaughlin:

<u>Iohn Mitchell Pughes</u> 1895 address <u>Dungiven Road</u>- maiden name of mother McGrath (probably an error)

James Pews/Plews 1897 address 29 Windmill Lane, father laborer

Rebecca Jane Pews 1899 address 29 Windmill Lane, father laborer d 1899

Frances Hume Pews 1900 address 29 Windmill Lane, father laborer

William/Samuel²/**Joseph**¹ **Pews** dob 1865 per 1901census. Married to Mary Hassen. Address Dungiven Road. He was a **bricklayer** and they were **Methodist**. No marriage records found, only birth records for children. Daughter <u>Sarah Pews</u> b 1897 in Workhouse Row m soldier John Thomas Gregson in the R.C. church. Son <u>Thomas</u> 1899-1899. They are listed as being <u>Methodist</u> on the 1901 census but her sister is <u>Presbyterian</u>. No proof of parents, address only.

William³/William¹Joseph¹ and Elizabeth (Lizzie) Campbell William Plews is a Railroad Porter/checker, address Drumahoe, m Lizzie in 1912 COI, Clooney Parish. Wm is living on Pine Street in the 1930 Derry Almanac and Directory. They had the following children:

William Cecil Plews 1915 address York Street, Waterside Urban

Irene Doris Plews 1918 address Ebrington Street, Glendermott or Waterside Urban

Albert Plews 1920 address 19 Pine Street, Waterside Urban

Sylvia Plews 1921 address 29 Pine Street, Waterside Urban

Robert/Samuel/Joseph ²/**Joseph** ¹ **(1877-?)** m Marg Thompson in 1908, Presbyterian. Their address in 1911 was Windmill Terrace when they married. They had two sons: <u>John Plews</u> 1910-1910, address Windmill Terrace at birth, and <u>Robert Plews</u> 1915, address Windmill Terrace. On Robert Jr's record his father is listed as a laborer and a soldier, Pte 6986, 161 Coy (unable to read the rest-A.S.C.?)

They are listed as COI on the 1911 census. In 1915 on an attestation for the service, he said he had been in the Irish guards, his trade is a saddler, (same as his father Samuel) and he is willing to be vaccinated and willing to enlist in the service for the duration of the war.

According to records on Ancestry tree RobertaMaryWard, son <u>Robert married Catherine Gill in 1935</u>, and later Mary Catherine Allen and ended up buried in Leeds.

Robert 1877-1956 and Margaret 1879-1950 both died on Foyle Road, proprietor John Thompson, possible a relative of Margaret's. 1921 Derry Almanac and Directory-living on Windmill Terrace.

Samuel George Pughs/William²/William¹/Joseph¹ m. Annie Gormley in 1907, COI. He is a laborer, address Drumahoe. They are living in Drumahoe on the 1911 census with daughter Mary. Samuel is a general laborer and he can read and write. They had the following children: Mary Plews 1908 address Fincarn, Waterside rural, father is a carter,

William Pews 1911 address Drumahoe

Robert James 1915 address Drumahoe

Frederick/ Samuel/Joseph ²**/Joseph** ¹ m Martha Baird- he is listed as a shoreman on Elizabeth's birth records and clerk on Samuel and Martha Ellen's. COI Address Moore Place when they married in 1914 and 1921 and 1930 Derry Almanac. They had the following children:

Samuel Plews 1917 31 Moore Street

Martha Ellen Plews 1919 31 Moore Street

Infant 31 Moore Street- died 1926

John (1883-?) m Mary Thompson No marriage record found-there is a birth record for <u>Samuel</u> born 1904, parents John Pughs-(living on <u>Moore Street</u>) and Mary Thompson. He is found on passenger index for 1909, father living on <u>Moon?</u> Street and 1913, brother <u>Alexander</u> on <u>Moore Street</u>. Apparently his wife and son died and he immigrated and remarried, living in New Jersey when he died.

James P Pews/Plews (Pughs on marriage record) and Elizabeth Logan m 1910- children ended up a Plews. They had the following children: Mary on the 1911 Census, born 1910, possible Mary Plews 1909. They were living with his in-laws. He apparently worked in the area when he was 15 as a farm servant and met his wife in Lough Enagh –about ten miles out of the city.






Glendermot, or Clondermot, is a parish, in the barony of

Tirkeeran. Places in Glendermot Parish include Bonds Hill, Clooney, Dunfield Terrace, Drumahoe, Dungiven Road, Ebrington Street, Finarn, Fountail Hill, Gobnascale, Irish Street, Meehans Row, Pine Street, Spencer Road, York Street.

Templemore is another parish in the barony of Tirkeeran, next to Clondermot. Places include: Bridge Street, Edenballymore, Gordon Terrace, Moore Street, Windmill Terrace.

When the first bridge over the wide river Foyle was opened, in 1790, it saw the formation of the Waterside area of the city. In time, the Protestants of Derry drifted over to the Waterside leaving the Cityside (as it is now known) almost entirely Catholic. https://www.wesleyjohnston.com/users/ireland/geography/derry.html

All Saints and Kilbarron both in Raphoe Parish, same as Robert Pue, related to Arthur Esq. in Mayo- may be a connection. Robert Pue's wife was RC.

Robert Pue Esq. Donegal came up in a google search, in a book published 1886 by John Fitzgibben Earl of Clare, which included a report on Spring Wheat published by the Dublin Society in 1806. This most likely was Arthur's son. No indication where in Donegal. Although they are mostly RC, there are a lot of McVeighs mentioned and the location and occupations are mostly the same. I am leaving him as family#3 for now.

Six ministers have served the congregation: Rev Samuel Burnside (1840-87), Rev John Johnston (1887-88), Rev David Hadden (1888-1910), Rev Edwin Pyper (1910-45), Rev James Adair (1945-81), and the Rev Stuart Finlay who began his ministry in 1982

Skillen Family- A note was found on the Skillen family. "Excerpt from Letter by Jamie McConnell on Skillen Family History (1995)". It states the Skillen's were "typical of other Ulster families, originally settled near Comber." (a town in County Down, Northern Ireland/5 miles south of Newtownards, at the northern end of Strangford Lough.. Wikipedia) In 1798, the United Irishmen tried to break away from England which were mostly Presbyterians. The movement failed and the families dispersed, going into the Mournes. (seems to follow the pattern of the Pues).

"Under the Penal Laws, enacted after the Catholic defeat in the Jacobite-Williamite war of the 1690s, all those who refused to acknowledge the English King as head of their Church – therefore Catholic and Presbyterians – were barred not only from the parliament but from any public position or service in the Army. Presbyterians, mostly descendants of Scottish immigrants, while not excluded as rigorously as Catholics from public life, also suffered from discrimination – marriages performed by their clergy were not legally recognized for instance."


Monaghan

*1641 Rebellion/Eleven Year War/Confederate War. 1641 -1652 "A bloody episode in Irish history, the 1641 rebellion erupted in the first instance in Ulster, when rebel Catholic elements surprised Protestant settlers, massacring large numbers. The sheer volume of deaths associated with the 1641 rebellion is a contentious issue, not least because the number of Protestant fatalities was soon inflated to several hundreds of thousands by contemporary and subsequent Protestant writers. Modern research calculates the actual number of deaths to be 12,000 out of a total Protestant population in Ulster at the time of 40,000, a massacre by any scale even if some thousands of these occurred as a result of military combat rather than the slaughter of the defenseless.


The so-called 1641 rebellion actually lasted for almost ten years. What began as an event associated with the massacre of Irish Protestants was to end with the equally notable massacres wrought by the armies of Oliver Cromwell who landed in Ireland in 1649. 

John Pews dob app 1860 married to Eliza Jane/Mary (1867-1918). All of the birth records say Eliza Jane or Mary, father unknown. The only way we know he is John is based on daughter Maria's marriage records in 1915. With the exception of John James, all of the other children were born in the workhouse. Eliza is listed as head of household in 1901 and 1911-both in Lisburn, Antrim. In 1901 she was listed as not married and in 1911 she was listed as widow. The entire family appear to work in the linen factory.
